ABOUT MCMH

Montgomery County Memorial Hospital + Clinics (MCMH), licensed for 25 beds, is an independent county-owned Critical Access Hospital governed by a seven - member Board of Trustees. MCMH consists of 170,000 square foot main campus located in Red Oak, IA, a rural health clinic in Malvern, and another in Villisca. The organization provides medical and surgical care for inpatient, outpatient, and emergency room patients. The organization’s primary service area is Montgomery County and surrounding communities. MCMH is the largest employer in the county with more than 325 employees. In FY2022, MCMH generated \$86 million in gross patient revenue and \$21 million in payroll that funneled into the local economy. As medical technology has evolved, MCMH’s sophistication has advanced as well. MCMH offers cutting edge medical technology and an excellent primary care staff supported by over 68 providers across 30 different medical specialties. In addition to traditional hospital services, MCMH offers a variety of specialized services which are laid out in this document. MCMH also includes the Montgomery County Memorial Hospital Foundation which was established to help the hospital meet its goal of providing modern health care services for area residents.

OUR HISTORY

MCMH + Clinics has been serving families twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week since 1907. The hospital reflects the progressive attitude of the people of Southwest Iowa who contributed more than \$860,000 to the new hospital building fund drive fund in 1989.



1907

The first hospital in Red Oak was established in 1907 by four physicians, Drs. Gilmore, Lawrence, Seabloom, and Reiley, in a building located at the intersection of Fourth and Washington streets in Red Oak. At that time, the 15-bed hospital was used primarily for cataract surgery.

1931

The City of Red Oak accepted a bequest of \$40,000 from Thomas D. and Ina C. Murphy and created the Murphy Memorial Hospital Trust which then purchased the hospital building and continued operations there.



1941

A new 26-bed hospital was built on Highland Avenue.

1951

The Section 1 wing was built in 1951, adding another 18 beds with the help of a generous gift from Oscar and Margaret Shepard.



1961

Highland Acres, a long-term care unit, was added in 1961. This section of the building was later adapted to hospital use when additional space was needed.

1974

Thirty-seven acres of land north of Highway 34 and Eastern Avenue was purchased for a future hospital site.



1978

Montgomery County voters approved the transfer of Murphy Memorial Hospital to County ownership in a special election. The facility then became known as Montgomery County Memorial Hospital.

1989

A new hospital facility was constructed at its present location of 2301 Eastern Avenue. The opening of the new hospital on August 26, 1989 marked the fulfillment of many years spent in healthcare planning.





1993

The newly constructed physicians center opened. This addition provided space for physicians practicing in the Red Oak Physicians Clinic, Red Oak Internal Medicine Clinic and also space was provided for a general surgeon and a retail pharmacy.



1999

A renovation of 10,000 square feet in the hospital lower level was completed to create a conference center as well as space for the education, and support departments.

2003

A new entrance was created that included an expanded canopy and gift shop at the hospital main entrance. This project was funded by hospital capital funds and a three year commitment of donations by the MCMH Auxiliary and MCMH Foundation.



2010

The hospital's clinical pharmacy was expanded. A new outpatient clinic was constructed. This new addition put all outpatient clinics in one convenient location, improving access for patients. This new addition also provided for an expanded emergency department and administration department, and the remodeling of laboratory, imaging, medical records, surgery and rehabilitation services.



2015

A renovation was completed in the Advanced Care Unit and the employee fitness center was expanded. A chapel was added near the clinic lobby.

2016

MCMH acquired 12.5 acres of land adjoining the west property line for future expansion.

2019

New clinics were built in both Villisca, IA & Malvern, IA.



2022

MCMH + Clinics Board of Trustees and Administration team began putting together a Master Plan for necessary renovations to expand the Outpatient Clinic, Inpatient services unit, surgery department and to add an in-house MRI machine.

Montgomery County Memorial Hospital provides the following services:

Advanced Primary Stroke Center - MCMH has earned The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval and the American Heart and Stroke Association's Heart Check mark for Advanced Primary Stroke Center certification.

CPR AED & First Aid Training Center - Certified instructors provide OSHA (The Occupational Safety and Health Administration) approved training programs.

Diabetes Education - The Diabetes Education Center offers classes to learn self-care skills, independence and lifestyle changes. Education is available on meal planning, blood glucose monitoring, medications and insulin administration.

Emergency Services - Emergency Services uses modern technology in acute cardiac care, acute stroke care, and tele-health communication over distance with psychiatric specialists for crisis intervention.

Hospitalists - MCMH offers hospitalists who specialize in treating hospitalized patients.

Internal Medicine - Internal medicine physicians and advanced practice providers provide comprehensive care for adults, young adults, and those with multiple concerns or chronic conditions.

Laboratory - The MCMH Laboratory is a full service lab which operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, using state of the art equipment. The Pathology Center in Omaha serves as the MCMH reference lab and the American Red Cross provides Blood Bank Services.

Physicians Clinic - The physicians clinic provides comprehensive health care for the entire family.

Nutrition Services - The Nutrition Services Department provides quality nutrition for patients at MCMH.

Oncology, Hematology, & Infusion Center - Offers chemotherapy and infusion therapy services with modern treatment and state of the art equipment in ten comfortable treatment areas. Chemotherapy, medical oncology, hematology, infusion, genetic counseling, survivorship care plans, nutrition counseling, pharmacist, cancer survivor support, and patient advocacy provided by certified staff. MCMH cancer care is a member of the association of community cancer centers.

Orthopedic Center - MCMH offers complete orthopedic care from start to finish, including clinic office visits, surgery, and rehabilitation.

Radiology - The MCMH Radiology Department provides a wide variety of imaging services to the people of Montgomery County and surrounding communities. The department offers musculoskeletal radiology, fluoroscopy, MRI, nuclear medicine, PET scans, CT scans, 2-D diagnostic and 3-D fetal ultrasound, 3-D mammography, tele-radiography, bone densitometry, and digital mammography.

Rehabilitation Services - MCMH offers Physical, Occupational & Speech Therapy by ASTYM certified therapists.

Respiratory Therapy - The Respiratory Therapy department provides a variety of respiratory care treatments and diagnostic tests for patients of all ages.

Skilled Care / Swing Bed - Skilled Care is a program provided at MCMH for patients who have been hospitalized and require rehab services or other skilled nursing care before going home.

Sleep Study Center - MCMH provides sleep studies. This is a test that records a variety of body functions during sleep such as the electrical activity of the brain, eye movements, muscles activity, heart rate, respiratory effort, airflow, snoring and blood oxygen levels.

Social Services - MCMH provides transition planning of post-hospital services, referrals to community based programs, financial counseling, advanced directives, and behavioral health services. MCMH + Clinics also has a health navigator that helps to connect patients to resources through social determinants of health screenings.

Surgery - MCMH has a multi-specialty surgery center providing an extensive cadre of surgical services for all ages, staffed by three full time CRNAs providing services 24/7.

Women's Health - MCMH offers obstetrics in partnership with Cass County Health System & Methodist Health System.

Wound / Ostomy Clinic - Provides care for difficult to treat wound and ostomy care issued by certified staff.

RED OAK, IOWA



Red Oak truly has something for everyone and is a great place to call home. Red Oak is quickly becoming one of Iowa's hottest destinations with five retail stores opening in the past year, incredible historic home renovations, a growing art scene, and facade improvements to the historic Fountain Square Park. Red Oak is, and always will be, where the heart of Southwest Iowa lives.

Red Oak, the county seat of Montgomery County, is home to more than 5300 residents. The downtown district was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2016. The focal point being the Fountain Square Park, home to the Red Oak Farmer's Market, Junction Days, National Night Out, and the Classy Chassis Car Show. In addition, the community has great parks and recreation facilities for those looking to hike, bike, disc golf, bowl, swim, skateboard, and more.



Entertainment opportunities stretch from a movie with the family downtown at the Red Oak Grande Theater, and live performance at the arts center, or live music and an art show downtown. Highlights also include the Montgomery County Family YMCA; the Red Oak Aquatic Center (renovated in 2019 making it the largest aquatic center in Southwest Iowa); the Red Oak Country Club featuring an 18-hole championship course, pool, lounge, and restaurant; Studio 147 - named Best of Southwest Iowa dance school; and the Red Oak Trails encompassing miles of recreational routes throughout the town. The Wilson Performing Arts Center, a 23,000 square foot facility with 268 seats opened in 2009 and regularly hosts performances from all over the world. In addition, the community is located an hour from the Omaha and Council Bluffs Metropolitan area - which has almost 1 million residents.



Red Oak offers many annual events including Rotary's Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Ambassador's Flight Breakfast, golf tournaments, Montgomery County Relay for Life, Red Oak Junction Days, homecoming parade, Southwest Iowa Gun Show, Trick or Treat on the Trails, Holiday Extravaganza, YMCA Turkey Trot, Autumn Home Tour, & Holiday Celebration Events.

BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT

Red Oak consists of more than 300 businesses including a variety of restaurants, retail, arts, automotive, manufacturing, grocery stores, home & garden, personal care, professional services, banking & financial, lodging, education & daycare, wellness & fitness, animal care, computers & telecommunications, agriculture, real estate, government, and healthcare. While Red Oak is primarily known as a farming region; manufacturing, retail, health and education all hold top places in industrial rankings for the region which boasts active economic development organizations. The community has a very active Downtown Urban Revitalization program and was one of the first Home Base Iowa Communities in Iowa. Home Base Iowa is a program connecting veterans and transitioning service members to over 2,000 businesses, 24 college and university partners, and 87 Home Base Iowa communities across the state.

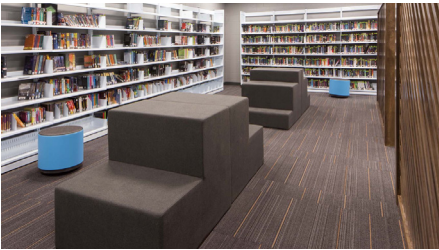

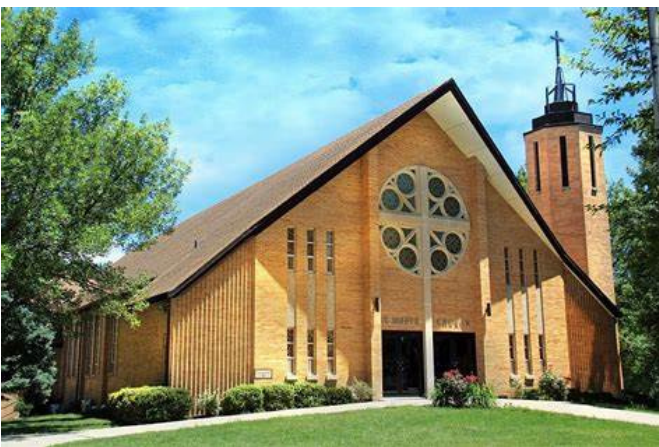
EDUCATION



Red Oak Community School District, a public school district, serves more than 1000 students in 3 different buildings. The district includes 86 certified teachers and more than 137 staff members. In the past 20 years, the district has seen more than \$39 million in improvements. Highlights include two new elementary wings, a new playground, the early childhood development center, remodeled junior/senior high school with new cafeteria, gymnasium, activities center, fine arts area, career & technical education area with a culinary arts training center, expanded ag programming, and new furniture and technology. The district offers comprehensive special needs programs, career focused programs aggregated for college credits, and a wide variety of college preparatory offerings.

Southwestern Community College is a 2 year, public institution located in Creston, Iowa with centers in Red Oak and Osceola. SWCC offers industrial training, career and technical education, adult and continuing education, distance/online learning and courses for transfer.

The Red Oak Child Development Center (ROCDC) provides childcare for children ages six weeks to twelve years of age and is part of the Red Oak Community School District.

The City of Malvern has a wide variety of great events, organizations, and businesses . It is a fantastic place to live and work. With many specialty stores to shop at, great restaurants to eat at, a round of golf at Fairview Hills, or a bike ride on the Wabash Trail, there is so much to do in Malvern!

Malvern's entertainment scene includes a summer concert series as well as a 4th of July Celebration which both draw crowds from the surrounding area. So much to do including visiting the local Depot or Library to soak in some information, taking a stroll through the historic downtown and stopping by the fine arts gallery or grabbing a bite to eat at one of the local restaurants. One of Malvern's best features includes the Art Church, which is an abandoned 19th century church that has been transformed into one of the most breathtaking art studios in Iowa. Though it no longer holds mass, it is sacred in its own way. Art Church is home to community events, meetings, workshops, and art shows.

There are a lot of outdoor activities to boast of in Malvern including the Fairview Hills Golf Course, a 9 hole public golf course located on the south edge of town. Malvern also has the Wabash Trace Nature Trail running through it. Stretching more than 62 miles through southwest Iowa, the Wabash Trace is a converted railroad right-of-way that runs from Council Bluffs to Blanchard on the Iowa/Missouri border. The Wabash Trace offers a journey through the scenic Iowa countryside. From wide-open farm fields flowing with nature's abundant harvest to the picturesque Loess Hills of Western Iowa, visitors to the Wabash Trace will find their journey on the trail a memorable experience. In addition, Malvern also has a swimming pool and a campground at Bohner Pond that offers fishing, canoing, campfires, and is walking distance from Malvern's thriving Main Street.

If you are looking for a fun place to stay, you may want to check out Malvern's Train Depot, small railroad depot renovated into a bunkhouse with two bedrooms, kitchenette and bathroom with shower. Malvern also has a lovely public library. The mission of the Malvern Public Library is to provide a wide range of quality information services to all patrons so their daily living, working and learning experiences will be enhanced to the fullest.

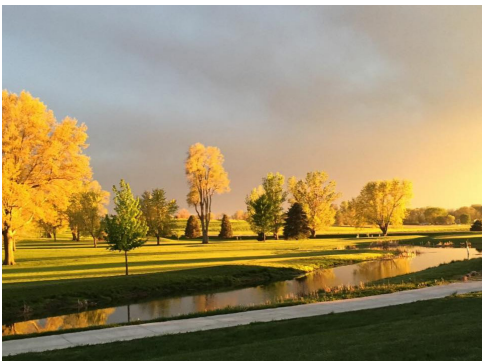

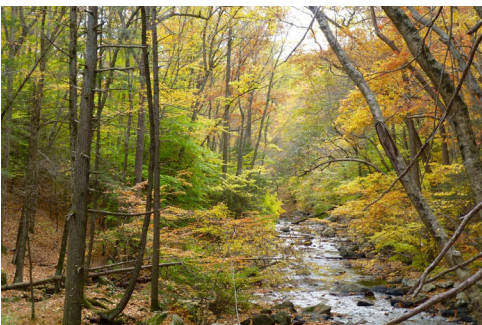

THE COMMUNITY - SOUTHWEST IOWA

VILLISCA, IOWA



The City of Villisca is lovely and a quaint place to live and work. With the rolling hills all around you, and so many fun things to do across the county, it is a nature lover's paradise.

The Villisca Axe Murder House pulls the most tourists to the area. On a quiet residential street in this small town sits an old white farm house. On a dark evening, the absence of lights and sounds are the first indication to visitors that this house is different from the other homes that surround it. Upon closer inspection, you'll notice the doors and windows are tightly closed and covered. An outhouse in the backyard suggests that this house does not occupy a place in the 21st century but somehow belongs in another era. A weather-beaten sign warns rather than welcomes. This is the "Murder House".

If you like to enjoy the outdoors, you will need to check out Hacklebarney Woods Park. This 230 acre outdoor recreational area offers two campgrounds, one lake, one pond, three picnic areas, one picnic shelter and six miles of hiking/equestrian trails. Park visitors can also enjoy fishing, boating (electric motors only), hunting, kayaking, hiking, horseback riding, and much more. Viking Lake State Park is only a short drive away from Villisca.

THE COMMUNITY - SOUTHWEST STANTON, IOWA

The City of Stanton is a small town that is full of life and just 10 minutes outside of Red Oak. Stanton is best known for its two water towers, the tanks of which are painted and shaped like a giant coffee pot and coffee cup.



To complement the array of small family run coffee and dining establishments, Stanton also boasts a Swedish Heritage & Cultural Center. In 1993, the old main school building was converted into a museum that opened in 1995 kicking off Stanton's first Midsommar's Day Festival. Stanton also has a lovely public library. When the library moved across town in 2014, a human chain formed and books were passed hand-to-hand in a community-wide event. The community involvement made each person feel connected to the new library.



For the nature lover, Viking Lake State Park is only a 10 minute drive from Stanton. A large portion of the 1,000 acre park has been left in its natural state and has an abundance of wild flowers, plants and wildlife. It is not uncommon to see beavers, turkeys, muskrats, ducks, shore birds and white-tailed deer.
